Both minor programs are interdisciplinary, meaning students will take courses in several departments, preparing them for careers in digital art, animation, electronic composition, character rigging, video game design, and more.

John Brooks, Producer-QA Manager of Firebrand Games Louisiana, will be onsite to explain career options for those interested in pursuing degrees in digital media. Scotland-based Firebrand Games designs racing games for Nintendo systems. With the help of BRAC and BRADIC (which LSU is a member of), they recently located to Baton Rouge, Louisiana, bringing 30 jobs and an annual payroll of about \$1.5 million. Firebrand has developed titles such as Grid, Race Driver, DiRT and Need for Speed, as well as all console versions of Trackmania. The company is now expanding into other formats and will soon be on all consoles including PlayStation®3 and Xbox 360.
